Re; BLM Resource Management Plan (RMP) update in Placitas

Dear Tom Gow,

I understand the BLM is starting the RMP update of the BLM in Placitas and Rio Puerco. The 5000 acres in Placitas is strategically located for a potentially beneficial rural economic development project through a clean Eco-Tourism plan, which could have significant socio-economic impact in Placitas and throughout the state of New Mexico.

I also understand you are also in receipt of the Equine Eco-Tourism Plan developed by WHOA and presented in committee to our state legislators as well as to the State Tourism department.

With this letter I request the following of the Bureau of Land Management:

- Allow the Wild Horse Observers Association (WHOA) status as a Cooperating Agency or Participating and Signatory Agency in the RMP process for reasons including the following;
  - WHOA is in coalition with and has the support of Home Owners Associations, the Placitas Chamber of Commerce, The Perdiz Canyon Wildlife Corridor Coalition, many of Placitas' realtors and developers, local builders, Hispano Round Table, American GI Forum, stakeholders, as well as the general population of Placitas and the state of NM through their representatives unanimous votes on SM02 (2006), SJM08 (2007), SM17 (2007).
  - WHOA has acted on behalf of the community in taking a proactive public safety stance through their installation of almost 5 miles of safety fencing and maintenance of another mile of fencing for the community. This was funded entirely by the Placitas community at large, over the last 4 yrs, on BLM, Native American, and Albuquerque Open Space property.
    - WHOA has erected fencing for individuals on private lands as requested to follow through on their offer to the Placitas community.
    - WHOA has the support of the general population as shown by their funding of this safety fencing.
  - WHOA has also partnered with the Pueblo of Santa Ana and proactively repaired and maintained the Pueblo of Santa Ana fence (1 mile) bordering with the Placitas BLM and continues to work with/for the Santa Ana Pueblo to manage the free roaming horses with a written Permit entirely staffed with a group of long term Placitas volunteers.

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- WHOA has successfully spoken for the Placitas community through their legislative work.
- WHOA has the support of the people of the state of New Mexico through their unanimous passage of relevant legislation.
- The NM State Tourism Department Tourism department's inputs to legislative council as recorded on WHOA's Eco-Tourism bills over the last two years has consistently stated that WHOA's plans, as identified in their bills, would help them meet their tourism goals.
- WHOA and its supporters will continue to be an excellent resource of volunteers for this 5000 acres.
- · There is precedent for this request which includes The Northwest Colorado Stewardship (NWCOS) gaining Cooperative Agency status in their RMP
- 2. Please give serious consideration to leaving this 5000 acres as an open space/wildlife corridor and recreational area. This is compatible with the National Historic Preservation Act which the Pueblo of San Felipe has also invoked regarding the free roaming horses of the area and is also compatible with the state legislation and memorial bills carried by Senator Komadina and signed by Governor Richardson.
  - This area is an important central location and focal point of a proposed NM Eco-Tourism project.
  - This project, as defined by WHOA and its collaborative groups, has merit.
  - · Additionally, horse bones, dated to the Ice Age, were found in the nearby Sandia Man Cave in 1938. These bones were Carbon dated in the 1950's and are 25,000 years old.

Additionally, the legal status of the free roaming horses in Placitas is not relevant in this matter as there are mechanisms to deal with this issue in either case, while also allowing for many other multiple uses including a wildlife corridor/open space. People can easily view study wildlife such as several species of birds, lizards, and snakes as well as larger animals such as bobcats, deer, and potentially wild turkey. In addition, they can participate in other recreational uses such as hiking, mountain biking, and horseback riding on designated trails as needed. The potential for academic studies in archaeology, anthropology, and geology are in abundance as well, providing a rich outdoor classroom experience.

In summary, the possible long term socio-economic benefits and associated benefits to wildlife in maintaining this 5000 acres as an open space/wildlife corridor between the Sandia Mountains, the Rio Grande River, and the three surrounding Native American Tribes with their associated open spaces are considerable and could also eventually be part of a greater wildlife corridor to the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. We understand you are about to start the Resource Management Plan (RMP) process for the BLM lands in Placitas and Rio Puerco. We and others in Placitas, as well as others around the state, are working in conjunction with WHOA to ensure that we find common ground in the effort to find win-win solutions for our variety of concerns regarding the Placitas BLM.

With this letter we join the Common Grounds Coalition with WHOA and the State of New Mexico (via their support, and their representative's unanimous votes for SM2 in 2006 and SJM08 in 2007) to keep the wild horses on the BLM in Placitas and other surrounding areas of Placitas.
